## **Objectives**

Students will be able to:

 transform words into different forms ie. nouns, verbs, adjectives and adverbs

• identify the relevant points from a passage and summarize it

#### **In-Class Activities**

### (A) Warm-up

- 1. Students are to turn to Exercise 3 of their Scan & Learn Series: Upper Secondary Editing and complete it. Should they require help, allow students to scan the QR code for clues.
- 2. Upon completion, have students do peer marking. Explain the answers where needed.

#### (B) Independent Work: Summary Writing

- 3. Tell students to read the Editing Exercise 3 again. Ask students what they would do to help ease the suffering of people around the world. Jot down their responses on the board.
- 4. Have students scan the QR code of Exercise 3 of Scan & Learn Series and read the online article.
- 5. Distribute Appendix A to students, and go through the summary questions.
- 6. Have students identify the relevant points.
- 7. With the help of the dictionary or dictionary.com app, have students summarise the passage (Refer to Appendix A)
- 8. Conclude the lesson by showing the video linked to the online article.
